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Description

Commissioned in 2016 by SCEGGS Darlinghurst for their 'Shakespeare 400' concert, Toil and Trouble is an atmospheric and visually engaging performance piece for large junior percussion ensemble. 12 or more players (Witches) play on plastic barrels (cauldrons) with rhythms based on the Witches' spell from Shakespeare's Macbeth. An eerie accompaniment is provided by a trio of experienced players.

Toil and Trouble provides an enriching group experience, in both the learning process, and the performance.

Instrumentation

3 Groups of Witches (4 players per group):

Group 1 (A+B)

4 plastic barrels (decorated as cauldrons), 4 sets of rods, 4 cauldron ingredients (eg. long tinsel threads, strips of fabric, fake entrails). Ingredients may be stored in plastic sleeves taped to the barrels. Group 1 players stand and play the rims of the cauldrons with rods.

Group 2

4 drumsticks, 4 wrist bells, 4 sets finger cymbals

Group 2 players sit and play the side of the cauldron with a drumstick held in the RH.

Wrist bells are also worn on the RH. Finger cymbals are on the LH.

Group 3


4 boomwhackers, 4 rattan handles

Group 3 players sit and play the side of the cauldron with a boomwhacker (RH), and a rattan handle (LH).

Accompanying Trio:

- Bass Drum
- Aux Perc gong, cymbal, wind chimes, bell tree, sleigh bells, tambourine
- 3 Toms high, medium, low

Performance Directions

Bars 1-13: As the trio play, the three groups walk on, behaving as witches making their way to a secret gathering. Group 1 enters first carrying cauldrons, followed by Group 2 playing sparse tones on finger cymbals, then Group 3.

Bars 27-36: During this section, the players in Group 1 each take a turn to drop an ingredient into their cauldron. This section can be extended to incorporate additional cauldrons.

Bars 42-48 can be used to for an optional 'play off' for the witches to exit in the manner in which they came on.

Witches' parts are to be played from memory. Vocalese are to assist with learning and memorisation and are not to be spoken aloud.

Toil and Trouble is best realised with the lights dimmed, and an element of drama!
